Community Details

Before the Living Water El Salvador team entered El Gran Chaparral, the team learned from the community leaders that if safe water were provided, the water would directly bless 25 families that currently live in desperate need of a safe and reliable water source. The water the people were using was collected from shallow wells that were contaminated by a nearby sugarcane plantation, as chemical runoff seeped into the community's primary water wells. The people also and unknowingly further contaminated their water sources by making unsafe hygiene and sanitation decisions. There were some families, though few could afford the luxury, that purchased water to drink, but many, because they are so poor, had no other option than to drink the dirty, chemical-contaminated water from the shallow wells. Not only were the people embarrassed by their limited, unsafe water options, but they were also weak and tired as the consumption of unsafe water opened and sustained doors to cholera, respiratory illnesses and other water-related diseases. Many families earn a living in El Gran Chaparral by working long, laboring hours for small, daily wages, and the people oftentimes will go for hours in the hot sun without water. When laborers do find water out in the fields, they drink from surface water sources or very shallow wells knowing that although their thirst may be quenched temporarily, they will most likely suffer disease later. Hopeful to end the cycle of sickness and disease that crippled health and stagnated community development, community leaders contacted the Living Water El Salvador team and asked for help, and because a generous donation was received from Decimus, the Living Water team was able to respond to the community's request and enter El Gran Chaparral with safe water.

To secure safe drinking water in the community, the Living Water team drilled a 36-meter-deep well, chlorinated the well and capped it with an Afridev hand pump that allows the well to yield 200 liters of safe water per minute. The people formed a three-person water committee who were trained to maintain the well and help keep the water safe. The water committee was also tasked with collecting a monthly well maintenance fee incase their well were to fall into disrepair or become subject to theft or vandalism. While the water committee was trained to maintain the well and manage water resources, other beneficiaries were shown how to make good, informed hygienic and sanitary decisions so that they could keep both their bodies and their water safe. During the hygiene and sanitation lessons, the Living Well Club also worked with the short-term team to weave in Scripture and Bible stories so that the people would have an opportunity to also learn about their Savior. To further engage the people in Scripture, the local churches, Iglesia Dios Todo Poderoso and El Gran Chaparral Asamblea de Dios, worked with the team to encourage families to know Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior. The local churches will continue to work with families to help cultivate not only ambassadors for Christ, but also new believers so that the impact of the "living water" can extend beyond El Gran Chaparral to other unreached communities in El Salvador. Hygiene Promotion

While safe water has the ability, when properly used, to improve health and serve as a building block for community development, it is essential that safe water be coupled with good hygiene and sanitation behaviors. To allow beneficiaries in El Gran Chaparral an opportunity to secure a foundation for community development and make informed hygienic and sanitary decisions that will improve their overall health, the Living Well Club used a participatory LWI Traditional Method to share hygiene and sanitation lessons. The Living Well Club even used the story of the "Woman at the Well," to engage beneficiaries in the lessons and to simultaneously weave in Biblical teachings during the training. The following lessons, disease transmission, germs, healthy and unhealthy communities, hand-washing-proper techniques and water-saving methods, latrine perception, diarrhea doll-causes of diarrhea, good-bad hygiene behaviors, clean hands clean hearts, tippy tap proper care of the pump and keeping the water clean, were shared with 85 beneficiaries who now know how to keep both their water source and bodies safe from contaminants and disease.

Community Member Interview

"First, we want to thank you very much and thank the almighty God for giving us this great blessing in our lives—for many long years, we have prayed for the great blessing of this well," shared 48-year-old community member and construction worker, Carlos Antonio Flores. "One of our biggest problems, [in the community], was the water. The water is heavily polluted because the wells are not very deep, and we live near a sugarcane plantation where, with the use of many chemicals, our water becomes contaminated. [Because of this,] we suffer from stomach pain. But now we thank God because we have clean water! We also want to thank the people who came from far away to help us. Thank you."

"In the community, El Gran Chaparral, the Word of God was carried through Brother Marvin as he spoke of the importance of the people not only needing physical water, but also spiritual water, which God alone can provide," shared the a Living Water team member, "Marcela, a Living Water team member, also shared the Word of God with help from the short-term team. Together, Marcela and the short-term team in the drama of the 'Good Samaritan', they evangelized the children through puppetry—where most of the children made the prayer of faith to believe in our Savior Jesus Christ!" During the week, 70 people (26 men, 16 women and 28 children) were told about Jesus Christ and this was made possible through the gift of safe water. Thank you, Decimus, for your donation that has allowed the people of El Gran Chaparral to know both safe water and the "living water," Jesus Christ.
